Many thanks to all those who contributed to make it such a successful event.








European Day of Languages



To celebrate National Poetry Day on the 3rd of October, some of our pupils took part in a poetry lesson with a difference, which was delivered online by the London-based poet, Simon Mole.

The theme of National Poetry Day was Truth.

Pupils were first asked to think of some memorable events from their own lives that they could picture clearly. Next, they had to note down at least three visual details from that memory. Thirdly, they had to describe some of the sounds they could remember – being as creative as possible and using techniques like onomatopoeia, or alliteration. The next job was to write a few sentences describing the main action of the event – focussing on the most important things that happened. Lastly came the fun part – moving away from the truth and introducing something magical or imaginary. Pupils then had to identify the main emotion associated with their memory and then think of something they could use to convey that emotion – for example colours, animals or sounds.

S4/5 Modern Studies have been involved in an educational project in collaboration with the Scottish Parliament and Magic Torch Comics considering the effectiveness of First Minister's Questions as a form of parliamentary scrutiny. The aim is to produce a resource to be utilised in schools throughout Scotland.







The first stage of the project involved a visit from Presiding Officer, Kenny MacIntosh MSP.

Questions ranged from 'How difficult do you find it to be impartial?' to 'Do you think 'humbug' is appropriate language to use in a Parliament?'

Scottish Parliament Trip

The second stage of the project took place the following week when the class accompanied by Mrs Laing, Mr Breen and Mrs MacFarlane, visited the Scottish Parliament. There attended they different committees. conducted a Q and A



session on parliamentary scrutiny with Maree Todd MSP and Edward Mountain MSP, visited the Debating Chamber, had a tour of the Parliament, watched FMQs and caught up with the Presiding Officer following his visit to the school. Two senior students were also asked to speak to STV on the Children (Equal Protection from Assault) (Scotland) Bill. The third stage of the project involved a workshop with Paul Bristow from Magic Torch Comics where students applied their research to complete storyboards for the educational resource.





Survival Cookery

S6 recently took part in survival cookery sessions run by the Home Economics Department. Many of them thought that this was going to be about survival 'in the great outdoors' however it was based around preparing them to be able to cater for themselves when they eventually leave home. Twelve dishes were produced in each session (four complete three course meals) allowing pupils to see how speedily and simply these could be prepared. The twelve dishes prepared could account for one week's meals. The total cost of all the dishes prepared in each session was approximately £9.50, much less than a takeaway pizza!




Coded solutions

2) Transposition Challenge

3) Atbash Cipher

This code was used to encrypt the Hebrew alphabet.

4) Caesar Shift Cipher

Julius Caesar used this cipher to protect messages of military significance.

5) Frequency Analysis
