Pupil Absences

Unexplained absence of pupils continues to be a problem in Scottish schools, and in Portree High School, this is no exception. I would remind Parents/Carers of their responsibilities and actions (taken from the Highland Council Attendance Policy):

Parents/carers will work in partnership with the school and can be made aware of School Attendance Management Processes and Procedures and Relationships and Behaviour Policy prior to formal enrolment, which include:

- Parents and carers will be responsible for the safety and wellbeing of their children whilst they are not in school
- Parents and carers will be responsible for providing the school with suitable emergency contact numbers and ensure that these numbers are kept up to date (at least termly)
- Parents and carers work in partnership with the school to promote and support positive relationships, attendance, learning and achievement

In discharging these responsibilities, parents and carers agree to the following actions as specified in the School Handbook:

- To inform the establishment of any prearranged absence, e.g. attendance at a hospital appointment or other unavoidable event, prior to the absence taking place
- To inform the establishment of their child's absence by 9.15am on the morning of the first day of absence. For afternoon sessions, parents/carers must inform the establishment no later than half an hour into the session
- To respond promptly to contacts from the school. To provide written confirmation of absence as soon as possible

Parents/carers will note that where contact cannot be established in relation to an unexplained absence, schools may inform other relevant services, e.g. Social Work and/or Police.

Basic Procedures

PARENTS/CARERS SHOULD REPORT ABSENCES TO THE SCHOOL ON THE MORNING OF ABSENCE BY TELEPHONE (01478 614810) OR EMAIL PortreeHigh.Absence@highland.gov.uk

If we have not heard from you and your child is absent, a 'Groupcall' text will be sent out. You cannot reply to this text, however you should call or email the school to let us know the reason for your child's absence or if you feel this has been incorrectly sent.

If there is an ongoing absence and we do not hear from you, one of the members of our staff will try to make contact with you to determine the reason for absence.



School Closures

If the school has to be closed due to adverse weather conditions, we will try to ensure that the information is shared as early as possible. On days where the weather is particularly poor, Senior Leadership Team consult with local transport providers to ascertain the road conditions and whether the companies feel that it is safe to travel.

It is the responsibility of parents or carers to decide if a pupil should attempt to travel to school, by transport or on foot, in adverse weather conditions. The Council encourages full attendance at school but in severe weather conditions the safety of pupils is much more important. Parents and pupils are often concerned that important examinations may be missed, but this should not override good judgement. Schools normally make alternative arrangements for missed examinations.

If the school is closed, we will share this on the Highland Council School Closure Site and our Facebook page. We will also try to send a 'Groupcall' automated text message to the primary carer, as listed on the School Management System.

GME Reps National Debate



Remembrance Day












Columba 1400 Leadershíp Academy

Free School Meals and Assistance with Clothing

To receive free school meals and assistance with school clothing, your household must be in receipt of any one of the following:

- Income support
- Income-based Job Seeker's Allowance
- Income-based Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Universal Credit, where the monthly earned income is not more than £796
- Child Tax Credit, but not Working Tax Credit, where the income is less than £19,995
- Both Child Tax Credit and Working Tax Credit where the income is not more than £9,552
- Pension Credit Guaranteed Credit

You can also apply if:

- You are 16 to 18 years old and receive any of these benefits in your own right
- You have no access to public funds, normally due to immigration status
- You are a family awaiting your first monthly Universal Credit Award notice

The School Clothing Grant is £154 for primary school children and £165 for high school children.

Clothing Grants and Free School Meals applications for this session are still open. **It's not too late to apply, especially if your circumstances have changed due to seasonal employment**.
